

DAVID ANOINTED KING

1 Samuel 16:1-13			
Memory Verse	"People look at the outward appearance, but God looks at the heart." 1 Samuel 16: 7		
Context/Background	The events take place in ancient Israel around 1000 BCE. It was a period of political and religious transformation as the Israelites looked to consolidate their leadership under a monarchy rather than judges. Samuel was a prophet, priest, and judge in Israel. He played a pivotal role in anointing both Saul and David as kings, making him a key intermediary between God and the people. Prior to David's anointing, Saul was the first king of Israel, chosen by God. However, his disobedience to God's commands led to God's rejection of him as king. David, at the time of his anointing, was a young shepherd. His humble occupation and youth contrast with the older and more established sons of Jesse, who were initially considered for the kingship.		
Summary	The prophet Samuel is instructed by God to visit the house of Jesse in Bethlehem to anoint one of Jesse's sons as the future king of Israel, as King Saul had fallen out of favour with God. Jesse presents his sons before Samuel, but none of them are chosen by God. When Samuel inquires if there are any more sons, Jesse mentions David, who is tending to the sheep in the fields. David is called, and upon his arrival, Samuel is divinely guided to anoint him with oil. From that moment, the Spirit of the Lord comes upon David, signifying his selection as the future king.		
Relevance/Application	Themes: Service, Humility, Quality		
Younger students:	 God Chooses the Unlikely: Like David, God uses ordinary people like you and me to carry out his special work. 		
Older students:	 Inner Qualities Matter Most: God places much more importance on how we care for and love others, rather than how strong or impressive we might be or look. Sadly our hearts aren't always loving. That's why God knew his people needed an even greater king – Jesus. Patience and God's Timing: even though David was anointed as king, he didn't become king right away. He had to wait and go through many experiences before becoming a great leader.

Catechism Connections	The Lord's Prayer - THE SECOND PETITION Thy Kingdom come. What does this mean? The kingdom of God certainly comes of itself without our prayer, but we pray in this petition that it may come to us also. How does God's kingdom come? The kingdom of God comes when our heavenly Father gives us His Holy Spirit, so that by His grace we believe His holy Word and live godly lives here in time and hereafter in eternity. We ask God to give us a believing heart like David's, so that we trust, love and believe in God. That's how God's kingdom comes to us, and how we can help spread God's kingdom to others.	
Discussion/Wondering Questions:	 Early Years What does a king look like? What made David special? Why are you so special to God? Primary David was just a young shepherd when he was anointed as king. What do you think this story teaches us about not underestimating someone because of their age or size? Why is it important to have a good heart and make kind choices, just like David did? Can you think of a time when being kind made a difference? Have you ever had to wait for something you really wanted? How did it feel? What can we learn from David's patience while waiting to become king? Samuel listened to God's voice when choosing David. How can we listen to God in our own lives? What are some ways we can hear His voice? Secondary Sometimes, we might not look like the strongest or smartest person, but God looks at our hearts. How can we show love, kindness, and faith in our hearts? David was chosen to lead his people. What qualities did David have that made him a good leader? What qualities make a good leader today? How might God be calling you to serve? How often do we get caught up in our outward appearance (or other people's)? Listening to this text, do you think that's what matters to God? 	
Images or objects to spark discussion	 A jar of oil: Show a small vial of anointing oil or olive oil. Ask students what they think it means to be anointed and why oil was used in the Bible for this purpose. Discuss the symbolism of anointing with oil and how it signifies God's chosen ones. Crown: Show an image or a simple paper crown. Ask students what they think it means to be a king or queen. How do they imagine David felt when he was anointed as the future king? A Picture of Bethlehem: Show a picture of Bethlehem, the place where David was anointed. Discuss the significance of Bethlehem in the Bible and how God can choose people from unexpected places for important roles.

Activities	 Early Years: Make paper crowns and write the children's names on them. Remind children that even though they are little, God chooses them to be part of his kingdom.
	 Primary: Make an inside/outside book. On the front, ask students to draw a self-portrait under the title "People look at the outside", and then on the inside page/s, glue in a heart under the title "God looks at what's in my heart". Students could draw pictures/write about what God likes to see in our hearts (being kind, listening to him, being brave to do the right thing etc).
