



# **JESUS ANOINTED BY A WOMAN**

Matt 26:6–13, Mark 14:3–9, Luke 7:36–50, John 12:1–8

#### **Memory Verse**

"The Son of Man must be killed and after three days rise again." Mark 8:31 OR

"So I tell you that all her sins are forgiven, and that is why she has shown great love. But anyone who has been forgiven for only a little will show only a little love." Luke 7:47

#### Context/Background

The story takes place in Bethany, in the lead up to Passover and with the time for Jesus' death and resurrection soon approaching. In John's gospel, Jesus is visiting the home of Lazarus, who had previously been raised from the dead. A woman (John's gospel says Mary) comes in and weeps at Jesus' feet and anoints them with expensive perfume.

Jesus Christ is God's anointed Messiah. The word Messiah means "anointed one" and derives directly from the Hebrew word for "anointed." Christ comes from the Greek word Christos, also meaning "anointed one." Thus, Christ is the Greek equivalent to Messiah. When Jesus receives the Holy Spirit at His baptism, He is "anointed" by God in preparation for His life's work (Luke 3:22; cf. Acts 10:38; Luke 4:18). Jesus is anointed with fragrant ointment in His work as the Savior, the King of heaven who was in preparation to die to save His people. The accounts differ in details. Some believe that the gospels are describing three different events occurring at different times. It is clear that in all accounts, the woman loved Jesus and wanted to give him a precious gift, and that in all cases Jesus approved of her actions and stood up for her to his disciples. Anointing the head is used in the Old Testament as a sign that God has chosen someone for a priestly/leadership role, like King David. In the New Testament, Jesus and the disciples use anointing the head with oil as part of cleansing oneself in preparation for fasting and prayer, and a means of healing people. Washing people's feet was the task of a servant, and normally a sign of good hospitality to guests arriving dirty from their travels. Some commentators point to the anointing of Jesus' feet with perfume/tears and drying his feet with her hair is an act of extreme humility, a foreshadowing of Jesus washing the disciples' feet.

Ointment, oils, and perfumes used to be put in vessels made of alabaster to keep them pure and unspoiled. The boxes were often sealed or made fast with wax to prevent the perfume from escaping. Alabaster was a beautiful substance and strong enough to keep the oil or perfume completely contained until the time of its use.

Nard (spikenard) was a very strong, long-lasting perfume which was extremely expensive. Jewish burial customs required that dead bodies be covered in a mix of spices and perfume to cover the smell of death.

#### **Summary**

After the dinner, while they were reclining at the table, a woman (Mary) comes to Jesus and anoints him with a jar of pure nard, a very expensive perfume. She wipes it on his feet with her hair, out of her great love for Jesus. Many of those who were there were disapproving of this. Judas (who John points to as a thief) says that the money for the perfume should have been given to the poor instead. But Jesus sticks up for Mary, using it as an opportunity to foretell of his own death and burial. Mary gives Jesus the most expensive perfume as a special gift.

#### Relevance/Application

#### Themes: love, forgiveness, service, appreciation

### **Younger students:**

- God loves acts of kindness and caring
- Jesus cared for the woman and stood up for her.
- Jesus loves it when we worship him by giving him our best.
- Money isn't as important as loving God.

#### Older students:

- Jesus encourages us to put our love of God and the needs of others above material possessions.
- Jesus defended the woman's devotion to him. We should stick up for others who are doing the right thing.
- Symbolism and foreshadowing Mary's act was symbolic of anointing a body for burial and Jesus used this act to foreshadow his own death and burial.
- When God sent Jesus to the world to die and forgive us, he gave everything. He is asking for the same thing from us. In Matthew 22:37, Jesus says, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and mind." He tells us to love God with everything. We may not have expensive perfume oil, but we have our time, talents, and treasure to give.

# **Discussion/Wondering Questions:**

- Why do you think Mary wanted to put perfume on Jesus' feet/head?
- How do you think Jesus felt when Mary anointed his feet with the perfume?

#### Primary

- Why do you think Judas didn't like what Mary did?
- If you were in Mary's place, what would you do for someone you love?
- How would you feel if someone shared something special with you to show they care?
- What is the most expensive or meaningful gift that you have given someone? What would you give Jesus for a gift if He came to your house?

#### Secondary

- How do you think Mary felt when the others suggested she should have given the money to the poor instead?
- Why was it significant that Judas made this comment?
- What impact do you think Jesus' words had on Mary and the disciples?
- This story is told in all four of the gospels. Why might that be significant?
   Each account is a bit different from the others. Why do you think this is so?
   Does it matter?
- Learn more about anointing (see The Bible Project link below). Can you make a connection between anointing and baptism?
- What do you think is the significance of a woman anointing Jesus?

#### **Activities**

#### **Early Years:**

- Students could draw different key moments in the story like the perfume
  jar, wiping hair on feet, angry faces of Judas and others, coins to represent
  how expensive it was.
- Make your own perfume (using food grade food extracts eg vanilla)

# Primary:

- Students to act out the story, and talk about the perspectives of different characters.
- Perfume Sniff Test: what's that smell? Soak several cotton balls in fragrant liquids such as perfume, vanilla, or lemon juice. Have students smell the cotton balls to try discerning what the aroma is.

#### **Upper Primary/Secondary:**

- A service activity that raises money or items for less fortunate.
