

JESUS TEACHES US HOW TO PRAY

Luke 11:1-13	
Memory Verse	
Context/Background	An unnamed disciple saw Jesus praying and when he was finished, asked Jesus to teach the disciples how to pray. Jesus responded by giving them a template for prayer which Christians refer to today as 'The Lord's Prayer', and told a short parable revealing to them what God is like when listening to and responding to our prayers.
Summary	Jesus assumes prayer as a regular rhythm in the life of a disciple when he says, "When you pray." 'Father' evokes an intime relationship with the listener of the prayer. It sets up the parable in verses 11-13. 'Hallowed' means to be regarded as Holy. This is both an act of reverent worship, and a heartfelt desire for those far from God to know God more. 'Kingdom Come' anticipates and aches for a new world order of peace and love to be realised and lived out <i>here and now</i> . (Heaven is now). 'Daily Bread' acknowledges God as the provider and sustainer of our life. It draws on Old Testament imagery of when God provided the Israelites with daily manna when they wandered the wilderness. They were challenged not to hoard up manna, to trust that it would come again the next day. 'Forgiveness' reminds us the more we know of God's forgiveness for us, the greater our capacity to extend forgiveness to those who wrong us. 'Temptation' sees that God guides our paths, and wishes us to walk wisely.
Relevance/Application	Themes: Prayer, Discipleship, Trust, Who is God?, Spiritual practices, Faith
Younger students:	 God is like a really good dad. We can talk to God when we're sad, mad, glad, and anything else, good or bad God is always with us in our breath, in the wind, and in our bodies. We don't have to have the right words, God knows what is going on with us.
Older students:	 The order of Jesus' prayer starts with who God is, then moves into our needs. God Dus, NOT Us God. Why might this be significant? Regular / Daily Prayer is proven to have positive impact on our wellbeing God is with us in every season of our life and wants us to know that he is good and we can trust him, and he will always listen to our prayers. Prayer is a gift from God to us, not the other way around.
