



JESUS WASHES THE DISCIPLES' FEET

John 13:1-17

Memory Verse

As I have loved you, so you must love one another. John 13:34

Context/Background

This story takes place during Holy Week, on the night before Jesus was crucified. The disciples are gathered with Jesus in the upper room of a house in Jerusalem. They are about to celebrate the Passover. This meal will come to be called the Last Supper, when Jesus instituted Holy Communion.

In this Bible reading, we see the Lord of all washing the feet of the disciples. Feet in the ancient world were fairly disgusting as the streets were filthy. Only the lowest of the slaves washed feet. But feet needed to be cleaned when you went to eat together. Jesus takes on the role of a servant to do what is required.

Summary

Jesus and his disciples were gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover. Jesus knew that he was about to die, and that Judas would betray him. He decided to show his love to his friends (even Judas) by washing their feet, which was normally the job of a slave or servant, to make them clean before they shared the Last Supper together. Peter was bothered by Jesus acting like a slave, but Jesus said that no master is better than his servant, and that the disciples should follow his example of humility and service.

Relevance/Application Younger students:

Themes: Caring, Humility, Service

- Jesus loves us.
- Jesus showed his love for his disciples by serving them.
- Jesus served all people by dying for our sins.
- We should love and humbly serve each other, just like Jesus.

Older students:

- The foot washing pointed the disciples to Jesus' supreme act of love and self-giving service, when Jesus died for the sins of the whole world.
- The focus of our faith is on Jesus of Nazareth who was crucified, died, then rose again from the dead. Jesus is more than a role model. He teaches us the way of God and brings us to the heart of God.
- In this story, we learn that God invites us to care for each other especially in providing for each other the most basic of needs. God's way is to humble ourselves and to bless others with the gifts that we have been given. We are not to think of ways to put ourselves first, but to ask what God would have us do for the sake of those ground us.

Catechism Connection

The water of baptism is "a life-giving water, rich in grace, and a washing of the new birth in the Holy Spirit". When we are washed by the grace of God through Jesus Christ, we are made right with God.

Discussion/Wondering Questions

Themes: Love, Service, Humility

Early Years

- Who cares for you?
- What things do people do to show you that they love you?
- What did Jesus do to show his love for the disciples?
- How can you help other people?

Primary

- Do you do chores (jobs) at home? What jobs do you do?
- What's the worst job anyone has to do at home?
- If a special visitor came to your house, would you make them do that job?
- What was Jesus willing to do for the disciples? What did he do for us (and all people)?
- What did Jesus command us to do in this story?

Secondary

- 'Actions speak louder than words'. What does this saying mean? What did Jesus' action of washing his disciples' feet speak to the disciples? What does it say to us?
- Which action of Jesus tells us most loudly that he loves us?
- What action can you use to speak to a friend about Jesus' love for them?
- There are people out there who need us. Which people around us need our help? Who is close by to us? What can we do to lend a helping hand?
