



THE BIRTH OF JESUS

Luke 2:1-20

Memory Verse

'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord.' Luke 1:10-11

Context/Background

Luke is the only gospel writer who related the events he recorded to world history. His account was addressed to a predominantly Greek audience that would have been interested in, and familiar with, the political situation. Palestine was under the rule of the Roman empire. Emperor Caesar Augustus, the first Roman emperor, was in charge. The Roman rulers, considered to be like gods, stood in contrast to the tiny baby in a manger who was God in the flesh. A Roman census was taken, and the government forced Joseph to make a long trip just to pay his taxes. Joseph and Mary were both descendants of David. The Old Testament is full of prophecies that the Messiah would be born in David's royal line. For ages the Jews had waited for the Messiah to be born.

Summary

Mary and Joseph had to travel to Bethlehem because of an order from the Roman emperor that a census, or record, of all people be taken in their hometown. After traveling on a donkey for several days, Mary and Joseph arrived in Bethlehem and were told there were no places to stay. The inns were full. Seeing that Mary was due to give birth at any moment, an inn owner told Joseph they could stay in his stable.

Mary went into labour, and Jesus was born in the stable. The only place for the sleeping baby to rest was most likely in the animals' trough, known as the manger.

During this time, an angel appeared to shepherds who were watching their flocks in the fields near Bethlehem. The angel told them the good news of the birth of the Savior and Messiah, Jesus Christ. The shepherds immediately went to find baby Jesus, who the angels told them they would find sleeping in the manger. Then they ran off to share the good news with everyone.

Relevance/Application

Themes: love, justice, compassion, humility, hope, caring, community, peace

Younger students:

- Christmas celebrates the birth of Jesus, our Saviour. God loves us so much that he gave us his one and only son, Jesus.
- Jesus became human to show us God's love
- We give gifts to one another to be reminded and to share in this love.
- Jesus is the greatest gift
- We should share this gift of good news with everyone.

Older students:

- The good news about Jesus is that he comes to all, including the plain and ordinary (like the shepherds). He comes to anyone with a heart humble enough to accept him.
- Jesus' birth happened the way it did to fulfil the prophecies and God's promises throughout the Old Testament. God always had a plan to rescue us from our sin and darkness.

Discussion/Wondering Questions:

Early Years

- What do you want for Christmas?
- How hard is it to wait?
- How excited are you going to be when you open your gifts?
- Who has a Christmas tree in their house? Do you decorate it? What do you put on it?

Primary

- What is your favourite thing about Christmas?
- What do you know about your own birth, or the births of others in your family?
- Is it hard to wait for your presents? Imagine how the Jewish people felt when they were waiting for a Messiah/Saviour to come. They had been waiting for hundreds of years.

Secondary

- What is a piece of good news you remember receiving? How did you react?
- In what ways is Jesus' birth good news for you? What will be your response this Christmas?
- Compare Luke's account with Matthew 1:18-25. What differences are there? What stands out to you in each account?
